

## Participating in *The Human Mind Project* Grand Challenges Forum

To access the Forum visit the [Grand Challenges homepage](#). The Forum is password protected: please log in with the username and password sent to you by email. To change your password, follow these instructions:

1. Ensure that you are logged in
2. Place your cursor on your name in the top left corner
3. Select 'Edit My Profile'
4. Scroll down the page to the 'About Yourself' section
5. Add your new password into the fields provided
6. Click on 'Update Profile'

### How to participate in the Grand Challenges Forum

The Grand Challenges home page shows a number of questions with images. Click on one of these to reveal the Forum for that topic. The Forum is an online discussion board for comments, questions and replies, of any length (within reason), on that particular topic, from members of the Board. To respond to an existing comment, scroll through any responses and type in the box provided. To open a new discussion thread, scroll down to the very end of the current dialogue and enter your comment there. You can also post links to publications or websites. If you would like to upload an image, a short video or an audio recording, or if you have any questions/technical issues, please contact [info@humanmind.ac.uk](mailto:info@humanmind.ac.uk).

You will be automatically notified by email of any follow-up replies to your comments. If you do not wish to receive these emails please untick the box 'Notify me of follow-up replies via email'.

Under each topic you will find video clips from interviews with members of the Board, which might stimulate comment. We hope to interview other members of the Board over the course of the *Project* to generate clips for other Grand Challenges topics.

New topics will be added to the Grand Challenges page at regular intervals. If you have ideas for topics, please let us know.

The Forum dialogues will be visible to anyone who logs on to THMP website, and we hope that this will stimulate a parallel public discussion on social media (reddit, Twitter etc). You will find information about this open dialogue on the Grand Challenges pages.

Our hope is that the Forum topics will provoke wide-ranging, iterative conversations that will eventually lead to the identification of ten Grand Challenges for the future of research on the mind, which we shall explore further in workshops, conferences and our final Report.
